Discovering your Spiritual Gifts

God's Word says in I Peter 4:10 "As each one has received a special gift employ it in serving one another as good stewards of the manifold grace of God." This puts the matter very simply. We all have been given gifts from God that we are to use in serving one another. The purpose of this inventory is to help you determine what some of your spiritual gifts may be.

This exercise basically asks you to respond to 160 statements based on your interest and experience in certain gifts. Do not respond on the basis of what you think you ought to say. Rather respond to what interests you. Don't let modesty hinder you from agreeing with statements that are true of your abilities.

If you are not interested in a statement then mark it with a "0" as "5" indicates strong interest.

GENERAL DEFINITIONS OF SPIRITUAL GIFTS

Prophecy

Predictions about the future and the end-time; special messages from God, often uttered through human spokesman, which indicate the divine will for mankind on earth and in heaven. The focus of all prophetic truth is Jesus Christ (Hebrews 1:2, Luke 24:25-27), who was destined to be the greatest prophet (Deuteronomy 18:15-18). He declared God's truth in this age (John 3:31-33) and the age to come (Isaiah 2:2-4). As the embodiment of truth (John 1:1), Christ fully radiated the brilliance of God which the earlier prophets reflected only partially.

Pastor/Teacher

The feeder, protector, and guide, or shepherd, of a flock of God's people in the New Testament times. In speaking of spiritual gifts, the apostle Paul wrote that Christ "gave some to be apostles, some prophets, some evangelists, and some pastors and teachers" (Ephesians 4:11). The term pastor by this time in Church history had not yet become an official title. The term implied the nourishing of and caring for God's people. The Greek word translated pastors in (Ephesians 4:11) is used elsewhere in the New Testament of sheepherders, literally or symbolically (Matthew 25:32); of Jesus, the Good Shepherd (John 10); and of "shepherds", or leaders, of the church (Ephesians 4:11). The NKJV uses the word pastor only in this verse. Also compare (Jeremiah 23:1-2).

Teaching

The act of instructing students or imparting knowledge and information. As used in the New Testament, the concept of teaching usually means instruction in the faith. Thus, teaching is to be distinguished from preaching or the proclamation of the gospel to the non-Christian world. Teaching in the Christian faith was validated by Jesus, who was called "teacher" more than anything else. Since sound instruction in the faith is essential to the spiritual growth of Christians and to the development of the church, the Bible contains numerous passages which deal with teaching (Matthew 4:23; Luke 4:14; Acts 13:1-3; Romans 12:6-8; Galatians 6:6). Special attention is directed to the danger of false teachings. Christians are warned to test those who pervert the true gospel (2 Timothy 3:1-7; 1 Peter 2:1-3). Sound teaching was a concept deeply engrained in the Jewish mind since Old Testament times. Moses and Aaron were considered teachers of God's commandments (Exodus 18:20). Parents were also directed to teach their children about God and His statutes (Deuteronomy 4:9-10).

Wisdom

Ability to judge correctly and to follow the best course of action, based on knowledge and understanding. The apostle Paul declared that the message of the cross is foolishness to the Greeks and a stumbling block to the Jews. But to those who believe, said Paul, this "foolishness of God" is "the wisdom of God" (I Corinthians 1:18-25) Against the wisdom of God Paul contrasted "the wisdom of this world" (I Corinthians 1:20; 3:19), "human wisdom" (I Corinthians 2:4), "the wisdom of men" (I Corinthians 2:5), "the wisdom of this age" (I Corinthians 2:6), and "man's wisdom" (I Corinthians 2:13). The Biblical concept of wisdom, therefore, is quite different from the classical view of wisdom, which sought through philosophy and man's rational thought to determine the mysteries of existence and the universe. The first principle of Biblical wisdom is that man should humble himself before God in reverence and worship, obedient to His commands. This idea is found especially in the WISDOM LITERATURE: the books of Job, Psalms, Proverbs and Ecclesiastes. In the Old Testament, the best example of a "wise man" is King Solomon (I Kings 10:4, 6-8; 2 Chronicles 1:7-12). And yet the same book that heaps such lavish, warm and glowing praise upon Solomon for his reputed wisdom (I Kings 4:29-34) also points out how Solomon's heart turned away from the Lord (I Kings 11:1-13).

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Knowledge

The truth of facts of life that a person acquires either through experience or thought. The greatest truth that a person can possess with the mind or learn through experience is truth about God (Psalm 46:10; John 8:31-32). This cannot be gained by unaided human reason (Job 11:7; Romans 11:33). It is acquired only as God shows Himself to man – in nature and conscience (Psalm 19; Romans 1:19-20); in history or providence (Deuteronomy 6:20-25; Daniel 2:21); and especially in the Bible (Psalm 119; Revelations 1:1-3). Mental knowledge by itself, as good as it may be, is inadequate; it is capable only of producing pride (1 Corinthians 8:1, 13:2). Moral knowledge affects a person's will (Proverbs 1:7; Philippians 3:11-12; 1 John 4:6). It is knowledge of the heart, not the mind alone. The Book of Proverbs deals primarily with this kind of knowledge. Experiential knowledge is that gained through one's experience (Genesis 4:1; 2 Corinthians 5:21; 1 John 4:7-8). The apostle Paul's wish for the church at Colosse was that they might increase in the "knowledge of God" (Colossians 1:10).

Encouragement- Exhortation

A message of warning or encouragement, designed to motivate persons to action. The apostle Paul often exhorted his fellow Christians to live out their calling as ministers of the Lord Jesus (Romans 12:8; 2 Corinthians 8:17).

Discernment

A gift of the Holy Spirit which enables a person to judge whether one who speaks in tongues or performs miracles does so by the power of the Holy Spirit or by a false spirit (I Corinthians 12:10). The apostle Paul suggested that a person led by the Holy Spirit will be concerned for those things that strengthen the church (I Corinthians 14:12, 26).

Giving

The act of bestowing a favor or an item on another person without expecting anything in return. The purpose of a gift may be to honor (2 Samuel 8:2; Daniel 2:48), celebrate (Revelations 11:10), or simply to bestow favor or help (Esther 9:22). God is the giver of every good and perfect gift (Matthew 7:11; James 1:5, 17), including eternal life (Romans 6:23), salvation (Ephesians 2:8), the necessities of life (Matthew 6:11), ability to work (Ecclesiastes 3:13; 5:19; Deuteronomy 8:18), the Holy Spirit (Acts 2:38; 5:32), spiritual abilities (1 Corinthians 12:4), and above all His indescribable gift (2 Corinthians 9:15), His Son (John 3:16). The Christian's gifts to God should not be bribes to obtain His favor, but grateful responses to what He has done in our lives. We are to give (Luke 6:30, 38) "for God loves a cheerful giver" (2 Corinthians 9:7). Giving itself can be thought of as a gift from God: "Having. . .gifts. . .let us use them. . .he who gives, with liberality" (Romans 12:6, 8).

Mercy

The aspect of God's love that causes Him to help the miserable, just as grace is the aspect of His love that moves Him to forgive the guilty. Those who are miserable may be so either because of breaking God's law or because of circumstances beyond their control. God shows mercy upon those who have broken His law (Daniel 9:9; I Timothy 1:13, 16), although such mercy is selective, demonstrating that it is not deserved (Romans 9:14-18). God's mercy on the miserable extends beyond punishment that is withheld (Ephesians 2:4-6). Withheld punishment keeps us from hell, but it does not get us into heaven. God's mercy is greater than this. God also shows mercy by actively helping those who are miserable due to circumstances beyond their control. We see this aspect of mercy especially in the life of our Lord Jesus. He healed blind men (Matthew 9:27-31; 20:29-34) and lepers (Luke 17:11-19). These acts of healing grew out of His attitude of compassion and mercy. Finally, because God is merciful, He expects His children to be merciful (Matthew 5:7; James 1:27).

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Evangelism

A person authorized to proclaim the gospel of Christ. In a more narrow sense, the word refers to one of the gospel writers: Matthew, Mark, Luke, or John. Literally, however, the word means, "one who proclaims good tidings" (Ephesians 4:11; 2 Timothy 4:5). The evangelist was a gift of God to the early church (Ephesians 4:11). These persons were not attached to any specific local church. They traveled over a wide geographical area, preaching to those to whom the Holy Spirit led them. The early disciples were also called evangelists (Acts 8:4) because they proclaimed the gospel. All Christians today may continue the witness of the evangelists, Matthew, Mark, Luke and John. As the evangelists spoke and wrote of Jesus, so many Christians bring His message to others.

Leadership

Jesus' life exemplifies these leadership traits. Jesus knows each of His sheep intimately (John 10:3-5). Sometimes several shepherds will pen their sheep together in a cave or a sheepfold at night. The next morning each shepherd calls to his own sheep with his own unique guttural cry. Each sheep knows his shepherd's voice and responds immediately. Even in a large flock, one individual sheep will run to his shepherd when his own pet name is called (John 10:27).

Faith

Faith is believing the Word of God and acting upon it, no matter how I feel, knowing that God promises a good result. A belief in or confident attitude toward God, involving commitment to His will for one's life. According to (Hebrews 11), faith was already present in the experience of many people in the Old Testament as a key element of their spiritual lives. In this chapter, the various heroes of the Old Testament (Abel, Enoch, Noah, Abraham, Sarah, Isaac, Joseph, and Moses) are described as living by faith. In addition, the Old Testament itself makes the same point. Abraham "believed in the Lord" (Genesis 15:6); the Israelites "believed" (Exodus 4:31; 14:31); and the prophet Habakkuk taught that "the just shall live by his faith" (Habakkuk 2:4). In the New Testament, "faith" covers various levels of personal commitment. Mere intellectual agreement to a truth is illustrated in (James 2:19), where even demons are said to believe that there is one God. Obviously, however, they are not saved by this type of belief. Genuine saving faith is a personal attachment to Christ, best thought of as a combination of two ideas - reliance on Christ and commitment to Him. Saving faith involves personally depending on the finished work of Christ's sacrifice as the only basis for forgiveness of sin and entrance into heaven. But saving faith is also a personal commitment of one's life to following Christ in obedience to His commands: "I know whom I have believed and am persuaded that He is able to keep what I have committed to Him until that Day" (2 Timothy 1:12). Faith is part of the Christian life from beginning to end. As the instrument by which the gift of salvation is received (Ephesians 2:8-9), faith is thus distinct from the basis of salvation, which is grace, and from the outworking of salvation, which is good works. The apostle Paul declared that salvation through faith, not through keeping the works of the law (Ephesians 2:8,9). Finally, in the New Testament, faith can refer to the teachings of the Bible, the faith which was once for all delivered to the saints (Jude 3). In modern times, faith has been weakened in meaning so that some people use it to mean self-confidence. But in the Bible, true faith is confidence in God or Christ, not in oneself.

Apostleship

The word apostle is sometimes used in the New Testament in a general sense of "messenger". For instance, when delegates of Christian communities were charged with conveying those churches' contributions to a charitable fund, they were described by Paul as "messengers (apostles) of the churches" (2 Corinthians 8:23). Jesus also used the word this way when He quoted the proverb, "A servant is not greater than his master, nor he who is sent (literally, "an apostle") greater than he who sent him" (John 13:16). Jesus Himself is called "the Apostle. . . of our confession" (Hebrews 3:1), a reference to His function as God's special Messenger to the world.

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Worship

Reverent devotion and allegiance to God; the rituals or ceremonies by which this reverence is expressed. The English word worship comes from the Old English word worthship, a word which denotes the worthiness of the one receiving the special honor or devotion. New Testament worship was characterized by a joy and thanksgiving because of God's gracious redemption in Christ. This early Christian worship focused on God's saving work in Jesus Christ. True worship was that which occurred under the inspiration of God's Spirit (John 4:23-24; Philippians 3:3). Although the New Testament does not instruct worshipers in a specific procedure to follow in their services, several elements appear regularly in the worship practices of the early church.

Craftsmanship

As society developed, the skills needed began to change. The early wandering Hebrew herdsman lived in tents of animal skins which they could prepare by themselves. When they started to move into houses in town, they needed a wider variety of skilled laborers. They needed builders, carpenters, bricklayers, and many other trades and occupations to build and maintain the houses. The more civilized society had a wider variety of needs. It demanded occupations and trades which could fill its clothing needs, provide health care, education, and other needed products and services. Ultimately, it needed skilled rulers and government officials to govern and maintain order.

Serving

Through Jesus the ancient mission given by God to Abraham – to be a blessing to all the families of the earth (Genesis 12:1-3) – is now entrusted to the church. The church's responsibility is to preach the gospel to Jew and Gentile, bondslave and freeman, male and female, rich and poor. To be a servant of God is to serve Him continually (Daniel 6:20). As His mission was that of a servant, so must ours be (Mark 10:42-45).
